- This is the fifth straight ranked matchup at the Valero Alamo Bowl.
- This is the first ever matchup between Iowa State and Washington State.
- The Cyclones are making their first appearance in Valero Alamo Bowl history. The Cougars are making their second appearance, but first since their 1994, 10-3, win over Baylor.
- Since 2014, there have only been five bowl games in the country with two Top-15 teams - the Valero Alamo Bowl hosted four of them.
- 10 Valero Alamo Bowls since 2005 have been decided in the final minutes of the game.
- Multiple publications are ranking the Valero Alamo Bowl as one of the top games this bowl season once again...
 - CBS ranks the VAB 4th out of all bowl games
 - Yahoo ranks the VAB 9th out of all bowls
 - SB Nation ranks the VAB 8th in watchability this year

Credentials will **not** be mailed. They can be picked up at the Media Center located on the 2nd floor of the Marriott Riverwalk Hotel during posted hours. If arriving on game day, credentials can be picked up at the east entrance of the Alamodome starting at 4 p.m.

MEDIA HEADQUARTERS

Media headquarters will be located on the 2nd floor of the Marriott Riverwalk Hotel. In Salon E/F, the Valero Alamo Bowl will provide media hospitality during the day, with evening hospitality in Suite 3004 on the 30th floor.

Media can pick up credentials in the Bonham room and then work in the Valero room, both on the 2nd floor. Non-game day press conferences will be held in Salon D also on the 2nd floor.

Room rates for the Valero Alamo Bowl media are \$150 per night plus tax, which includes Internet access in the sleeping rooms, lobby and restaurants. These rates are only valid from Dec. 22-30. All media rooms must be booked through the credential system on the bowl's website. The Marriott Riverwalk will not accept room reservations directly from media members at this rate. Please note that the bowl will not assign rooms until Dec. 20, so the hotel will not have a record of your name until after that date.

Parking at the Marriott is valet only and \$50 a day, but daily parking is available in the Convention Center garage near the hotel for \$11 a day with no in/out privileges.

Frequency Coordination

Any media member with a camera or video camera must register with our frequency coordinator. At the east entrance, you can enter and have your bag tagged and registered. Then you'll go to the photo workroom, located field level across from the visitors locker room, where you'll receive a photo vest. You will not be allowed onto the field with a camera if you have not registered with the coordinator and aren't wearing a photo vest.

Valero Alamo Bowl Outstanding Players

The Outstanding Offensive and Defensive Players for the Valero Alamo Bowl will be named through online media voting. Visit alamo.statbroadcast.com during the fourth quarter, then click on the link on the right-hand side to place your vote.

Post-Game Field Access

The quickest way to get to the field and locker rooms from the press box is via an internal stairwell that is adjacent to the east elevators. Directional signage will be posted. Media can also access the field and the post-game interview room by taking the Alamodome east elevators outside the press box to level 1 and making a left toward the locker rooms.

Post-Game Interviews

Head coaches and select players will be available to the media following the conclusion of the game. A formal interview room will be clearly marked and located directly across from the visiting team's locker room. The losing team will be at the dais first followed by winning team. Audio will be piped into press box and quotes will be provided. Admission to each school's locker room will be granted in accordance with each school's post-game interview policy.

Media Shuttle

Available from 4 p.m. - 7 p.m. and end of game for 2.5 hours.

GENERAL GAME NOTES

THE #1 BOWL OUTSIDE OF THE CFP

- The Valero Alamo Bowl improved its selection rights in 2014 with the Big 12 and Pac-12 conferences. Since that time, the Bowl has selected the No. 1 teams from both conferences after the CFP/NY6 selections.
- Since 2014, there have been five bowl games across the country featuring two top-15 teams: the Valero Alamo Bowl has hosted four of them.
- This year's matchup is the fifth straight top-25 game at the Valero Alamo Bowl. From the Bowl's first year in 1993 through 2013, the Bowl only had six top-25 matchups.
- The average ranking of a team in the Valero Alamo Bowl since 2014 is No. 13.
- This is the sixth straight Valero Alamo Bowl where at least one team had 10 regular season wins.

GAME HYPE

- CBS ranks the VAB 4th out of all bowl games.
- Yahoo ranks the VAB 9th out of all bowls.
- SB Nation ranks the VAB 8th in watchability this year.
- ESPN says the VAB is the 8th most entertaining game this bowl season.
- 24/7 Sports calls the VAB the 6th best game.
- Stewart Mandel of The Athletic ranks the Valero Alamo Bowl 8th this year.

IOWA STATE NOTES

- Iowa State has never played in the Alamodome
- The Cyclones have not played an entire indoor game since 1997 (at Minnesota in the Metrodome). During their 2005 appearance in the Houston Bowl, the roof was partially open and their 2000 appearance in the Insight Bowl, the roof was closed after the first quarter.
- Iowa State has never played Washington State but has a 21-58-2 record against current Pac-12 schools.
- ISU is 1-3 against teams coached by Mike Leach - they played four times during Leach's tenure at Texas Tech.
- There is one coaching connection between the two schools - former Iowa State head coach Jim Walden (1987-94) was the head coach at WSU from 1978-86.
- 2017 and 2018 mark the best two-year run in Iowa State history as they've won 8 games back-to-back for the first time since the 1970s. A Valero Alamo Bowl win would mark the most wins in any 2-year span in school history.
- The Cyclones have a 1,000-yard rusher and receiver for the first time in school history in David Montgomery and Hakeem Butler.

WASHINGTON STATE NOTES

- Washington State has appeared in the Alamodome twice - once in their 1994 Valero Alamo Bowl win over Baylor, 10-3. More recently in a 2009 40-14 loss to Notre Dame in the Shamrock Series played in San Antonio.
- The Cougars are 3-0 all-time in bowl games played in Texas winning the 2001 and 2015 Sun Bowls, as well as the 1994 Alamo Bowl.
- Mike Leach was the head coach of Texas Tech in their 2001 SYLVANIA Alamo Bowl 19-16 loss to Iowa.
- The Valero Alamo Bowl record for pass completions (32) is held by Arizona's Nick Foles and pass attempts (53) by Drew Brees. Washington's Keith Price holds the record for passing touchdowns (4) and yards passing (438). WSU quarterback Gardner Minshew II averaged 36 completions, 51 attempts, 3 TDs and 373 passing yards per game this season.
- A Valero Alamo Bowl win would give the Cougars a school-record 11th win.



OVERVIEW

The Iowa State offense has been one of the country's best since Brock Purdy took over as quarterback against Oklahoma State on Oct. 6. Complimented by All-American tailback David Montgomery and All-American receiver Hakeem Butler, the Cyclone offense is tough to get off the field. Anytime that Montgomery or Butler has their hands on the ball they are a threat to score.

IOWA STATE CYCLONE OFFENSE

MONTGOMERY MATTERS

- Montgomery is one of the nation's best backs and was named first-team All-American by Pro Football Focus for the second straight year.
- He has forced more missed tackles (199) than anyone else in the country over the past two years.
- Montgomery was a first-team All-Big 12 selection last year and second-team this season.

THE PURDY EFFECT

- The insertion of true freshman Brock Purdy at quarterback in the Cyclones' fifth game vs. Oklahoma State lit a spark in the Iowa State offense.
- Since Purdy first start in a win against Oklahoma State, the Cyclones are averaging 31.5 points and 388.8 yards per game.
- Purdy's 172.7 passing efficiency total is sixth best in the country and he ranks fourth in the nation in yards per completion (15.1).
- Purdy has accounted for 19 (16 pass, 3 rush) of Iowa State's 32 touchdowns in the last eight games.

HAKEEM THE DREAM

- Junior WR, Hakeem Butler, has nine TD catches this year, one shy of Allen Lazard's school mark of 10.
- Butler leads the nation in yards per catch (22.1) and his 10 plays of 40+ yards are good for third best in the country.
- He can extend his school record 1,126 yards this season in the Valero Alamo Bowl.
- Since Purdy took over at QB, Butler has been his favorite target - averaging 101.9 yards per game and hauling in six TDs.



OVERVIEW

The Iowa State defense is one of the nation's best, as it has held 10 of its opponents under their scoring average this year. Over the span of 20 games, the Cyclones have only given up 24+ points four times. Since the start of conference play, Iowa State ranks first in scoring defense and rushing defense, and second in total defense. Led by Greg Eisworth, JaQuan Bailey and a group of dynamic defensive backs, the Cyclones are tough to score on.



IOWA STATE CYCLONE DEFENSE

PEAVY ISLAND

- Brian Peavy is consistently called one of the best cornerbacks in the country.
- He is a four-time Big 12 honoree and was named first-team All-American by PFF.
- He leads the team in passes defended (9) and his 44 defended passes in his career rank second in the country.
- Peavy leads all active Cyclones in career starts (46) and is one of two Cyclones in school history to have appeared in and beat every conference team.



ELITE EISWORTH

- Redshirt sophomore safety Greg Eisworth was named Big 12 Defensive Newcomer of the Year and to the All-Big 12 first-team by coaches and ESPN.
- Eisworth leads the team in tackles (84), including a 14-tackle performance against Oklahoma.
- Started in the first 11 games of the season

BIG PLAY BAILEY

- Junior DE JaQuan Bailey leads the team in sacks (7) and TFL (12.5) - good for a top-10 ranking in both categories in the Big 12.
- Ranks ninth in ISU history with 29.5 TFL and his 17.5 career sacks are one shy of the school record.
- Was named Big 12 Co-Defensive Player of the Week after the WVU game.

OVERVIEW

The Washington State Cougar offense, led by Mike Leach, is once again, one of the best in the country. Leading the country in passing offense with Gardner Minshew II at quarterback, the Cougar offense is as prolific as ever. Averaging 38.3 points per game, the Cougars have put up more points per game this year than any Washington State team of the last 20 years. Washington State scored 30+ points in nine contests this year, including a 69-point outing against Arizona. Once in the redzone, the Cougars score at a blistering clip of 87 percent of the time.



WASHINGTON STATE COUGAR OFFENSE

MUSTACHE MAGIC

- Gardner Minshew II makes the Washington State offense go and was named the Pac-12 Offensive Player of the Year and won the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm award.
- His 433 completions lead the country and he ranks 3rd nationally in completion percentage. Minshew II leads the nation in passing yards per game (373.3) by more than 20 yards.
- His 36 TDs were good for fifth best in the country and helped him finish fifth in Heisman Trophy voting.
- Minshew II needs only 240 passing yards in the Valero Alamo Bowl to break Jared Goff's Pac-12 single season record for passing yards.

SPREADING THE WEALTH

- In 11 games this year, the Cougars had at least nine players catch a pass.
- Washington State is the only school in the country to have nine receivers with 25+ receptions.
- The Cougars had eight different receivers lead the team in receptions in different games this season.
- Three receivers (Williams, Martin, Patmon) rank in the top-16 in the Pac-12 this year in receptions.

RUN WILLIAMS RUN

- Running back James Williams is second in the Pac-12 this year with 16 total touchdowns (12 rush/4 receiving).
- For the first time in Valero Alamo Bowl history, a tailback will lead both teams in receptions, as Williams' 76 receptions are 2nd in the conference and 25 more than any Iowa State player. He needs three receptions to break the Pac-12 single season record for receptions by a running back.
- Williams has 195 receptions on his career, fifth most in school history



OVERVIEW

The “Speed D” has thrived this year under first year Defensive Coordinator Tracy Claeys. The Cougar defense leads the Pac-12 in sacks (35), is fourth in points allowed per game (23.1) and fourth in yards allowed per game (346.6). The Cougars held 2017 Heisman runner-up Bryce Love to just 71 yards and held the Oregon Ducks to just 58 rushing yards, the fewest for the Ducks since 2007.



WASHINGTON STATE COUGAR DEFENSE

PELLUER'S CURTAIN CALL

- Redshirt senior linebacker Peyton Pelluer has 340 career tackles, 7th most in Pac-12 history.
- This season, the Sammamish Wash., native leads the team with 86 total tackles, good for 4th in the Pac-12.
- But Pelluer is versatile and gets to the QB more than any other linebacker in the conference, as he ranks in the top-15 nationally in QB hurries for a linebacker.
- He has the second most TFL on the team (9.0) and 4th most sacks (3.5) as he continues to be the anchor of a good Cougar defense.

THE CLAEYS TURNAROUND

- Defensive Coordinator Tracy Claeys is in his first year on the Washington State sideline.
- His Cougar defense is allowing just 23.1 points per game, tied for the best mark at the school since 2003.
- Claeys' defense focuses on TFL and sacks to put teams behind the chains. In both categories, the Cougars lead the conference in sacks and rank fourth in TFL.



NO FLY ZONE

- The Washington State secondary has been exceptional this year, led by Jalen Thompson, who was named to the True Freshman All-America Team in 2016.
- The secondary is allowing just 210 yards per game, third best in the conference after leading the conference in pass defense last season.



IOWA STATE CYCLONES HEAD COACH MATT CAMPBELL 2018 BIG 12 CO-COACH OF THE YEAR

Matt Campbell, who has an amazing championship pedigree as both a player and coach, was named head football coach at Iowa State University on Nov. 29, 2015.

Campbell initiated his rebuilding plan and laid the foundation of future success in his first season as the head man at Iowa State in 2016.

He implored his team to “Trust The Process,” and in year two of the Campbell era, it paid major dividends.

Campbell's recent two-year run has caught the nation's attention with their drastic improvement, placing Iowa State football into the national rankings and the college football spotlight. Campbell, who was named Big 12 Coach of the Year in back-to-back seasons (2017, 2018), has the Cyclones bowling for the second-straight season and cemented the Iowa State program as a player nationally.

The 2018 Iowa State football team once again captured the imagination of college football fans by proving the 2017 campaign wasn't a fluke. Despite a 1-3 beginning to the season, Campbell kept the Cyclones on the right path by making an amazing turnaround with a five-game winning streak, the best single-season conference victory string in school history. Campbell's team finished the year winning seven of its last eight games, earning a berth in the Valero Alamo Bowl.

The 2017 Iowa State football season will go down as one of its best in recent history thanks to Campbell's coaching efforts. Defensively, the Cyclones posted historic numbers, ranking in the top-30 nationally in scoring defense (26th, 20.9) and turnover margin (16th, +10). Iowa State was second in the Big 12 (league games only) in scoring defense (18.9) and total defense (357.2), holding nine of 10 conference opponents to at least 10 points below their season average.

The Cyclones broke school marks in fewest turnovers and fewest fumbles lost in a season, going nearly the entire year before losing their first fumble, tying the NCAA FBS all-time record along the way.

Campbell was lauded for his efforts in 2017, earning Big 12 Coach of the Year honors. He was also the AFCA Region 4 Coach of the Year.

Before taking over at Iowa State, Campbell was the head coach at Toledo.

Campbell compiled a 35-15 record in four-plus seasons as the head coach at Toledo and led the Rockets to three nine-win seasons. He coached UT in three bowls and his 2015 Rocket team played in the Boca Raton Bowl after being hired at Iowa State. Campbell's winning percentage (.700) is third-best in school history. He was honored as the 2015 MAC Coach of the Year.

Campbell and his wife (Erica) have four young children: Kaetlyn, Isabella, Rudy and Rocco. Campbell earned a bachelor's degree in history from Mount Union in 2002.

WASHINGTON STATE COUGAR HEAD COACH MIKE LEACH 2018 PAC-12 COACH OF THE YEAR

Mike Leach, the 2018 Pac-12 Coach of the Year, is in his seventh season leading the Washington State Cougar football program after being named the Cougars' head football coach, Nov. 30, 2011. Leach has guided WSU to five bowl appearances in his first seven years, including each of the last four years, a program first.

This season Leach was recognized for one of his finest jobs coaching, leading the Cougars to a 10-2 regular season record, including seven-straight wins at one point. The Cougars were ranked in the top 13 of each College Football Playoff Ranking, including four-straight weeks at No. 8, while also leading the nation in passing for the third time in the past five years. Senior quarterback Gardner Minshew II, leads the nation in passing yards per game and total offense. The most notable improvement came from the offensive line, which allowed 44 sacks in 2017 (124th nationally) and only 11 (7th) in 2018.

In 2017, Leach guided WSU to a 9-4 record, 6-3 in conference play, and a second-straight Holiday Bowl appearance and third-straight bowl game overall. The Cougars opened the season with six-straight victories and posted wins over No. 5 USC and No. 18 Stanford. Once again, the Cougar offense ranked among the national leaders in passing offense (2nd) while the defense ranked in the national top 25 in seven categories, including four in the top 10. Senior offensive lineman Cody O'Connell repeated as a First-Team All-American while junior Hercules Mata'afa also earned First-Team All-American honors.

In 2016, the Cougars posted an 8-5 mark, including a 7-2 record in Pac-12 play, along with an appearance in the Holiday Bowl. Leach guided a WSU offense that led the Pac-12 and finished third nationally in passing (362.5 ypg), and also led the Pac-12 in completion percentage, second nationally, at .703 percent. WSU won eight-straight games midway through the season, the most since the 1930 campaign. Redshirt junior offensive lineman Cody O'Connell was a unanimous All-American and finalist for the Outland Trophy.

The Cougars ended the 2015 season with a 9-4 record, 6-3 in the Pac-12 Conference, capped by a 20-14 Sun Bowl victory over Miami as Leach was named Pac-12 Co-Coach of the Year. After starting the season 2-2, the Cougars went 7-2 over the final nine games, posting last-minute victories at Oregon and No. 18 UCLA, and rallying from a fourth-quarter deficit in a 38-24 victory against Arizona State. For the second-straight season WSU led the nation in passing at 389.5 ypg. Senior offensive lineman Joe Dahl earned Second-Team All-America honors while defensive lineman Hercules Mata'afa garnered First-Team Freshman All-American honors by USA Today.

In 2014 Leach's offense led the nation in passing at 477.7 yards per game, the second-highest total in FBS history, trailing only Houston's 511.3 in 1989. WSU set or tied 42 school, conference or NCAA records during the season, including quarterback Connor Halliday who threw for an NCAA single-game record 734 yards against California.

In 2013, Leach's second season at the helm of the Cougars, he guided Washington State to the Gildan New Mexico Bowl, the first bowl game for the Cougars in a decade. WSU ranked fourth in the nation in passing offense, setting a school-record at 368.00 yards per game. Quarterback Connor Halliday set WSU single-season records for passing yards (4,587), attempts (714) and completions (449), the first WSU quarterback to surpass the 4,000-yard mark. Safety Deone Bucannon became WSU's first All-America first-team selection since 2005 and was later selected as the No. 27 overall pick in NFL Draft by the Arizona Cardinals, the first Cougar taken in the first round since 2003.

In his first season in Pullman, Leach's high-powered offense led the Pac-12 Conference in passing, averaging 330.42 yards per game. That figure ranked ninth nationally and marked the second-highest average in school history.

Prior to Washington State, Leach had coaching stints at Texas Tech, Oklahoma, Kentucky, Valdosta State, Iowa Wesleyan, as well as one-year stints at College of the Desert and Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo. He also served as head coach in Pori, Finland with the European Football League.

After graduating with honors from BYU in 1983, Leach earned a master's degree from the U.S. Sports Academy and his law degree from Pepperdine University, where he graduated in the top third of his class.

The oldest of six siblings, Leach and his wife, Sharon, are the parents of four children; Janeen, Kim, Cody and Kiersten, along with three grandchildren.

DAVE PASCH

Dave Pasch serves as a play-by-play commentator for ESPN, primarily working college football, men's and women's college basketball and the NBA. Pasch joined the network in 2003, and has also worked the WNBA, Arena Football, the Great Outdoor Games and the Little League World Series.

Since 2002, he has also been the radio voice of the NFL's Arizona Cardinals. Pasch also called select college basketball, NFL and golf events for CBS Radio/Westwood One from 1999-2003. From 1999-2002, he was the radio voice for Syracuse football and basketball. Pasch also called select NFL and NFL Europe games for Fox Sports in 2002 and 2003, and did the Buffalo Bills preseason telecasts in 2001.

Before his work at Syracuse, Pasch worked for WMAQ-AM in Chicago. His duties included hosting a talk show and the Chicago Blackhawks' pre-game show, as well as calling play-by-play on select Blackhawks broadcasts. From 1995-1997, Pasch worked for WDFN-AM in Detroit, serving as a sports anchor, talk show host and play-by-play commentator for the International Hockey League, Detroit Vipers, broadcasts.

Pasch worked for West Virginia Radio Corporation from 1994-1995 as a news and sports anchor, and he called high school football play-by-play. From 1990-1994, he worked at WAER-FM, the Syracuse University student station.



GREG MCELROY

Greg McElroy serves as a college football analyst for Saturday games on ABC/ESPN, and also contributes to SEC Network's studio show SEC Now. In fall of 2017, he joined Marcus Spears for a new, weekly hour of SEC football talk as Thinking Out Loud debuted on September 4 on SEC Network. He joined ESPN in 2014 as an analyst for the SEC Network.

McElroy was an Alabama quarterback from 2007 to 2011 during which time he led the team to win the 2010 BCS National Championships. He had previously ushered the Crimson Tide to an SEC Football Championship title and was named MVP (2009). He was named 2010 ESPN/CoSIDA Academic All-American of the Year and first-team Academic All-American. He finished his college career with a 24-3 record.

The New York Jets drafted McElroy in 2011 and he retired from the Cincinnati Bengals in 2013.

He graduated from University of Alabama in three years with a degree in business marketing and went on to earn a Master of Science degree in sports management in 2010, with a 4.0 GPA. Often cited for as a cerebral quarterback, for his intelligence, he was a Rhodes Scholarship finalist in 2010. McElroy is from Arlington, Texas.

Former collegiate and Arena football star Tom Luginbill joined Scouts Inc. in 2002. When the NFL-based company was purchased by ESPN, Luginbill was promoted to national recruiting director. Luginbill has an extensive background in professional football as well as talent evaluation and has served in various scouting capacities since 1996.

2017 VALERO ALAMO BOWL
#15 TCU 39, #13 Stanford 37
Dec. 28, 2017 - 57,653 - ESPN

Since 2005, 10 Valero Alamo Bowls have not been decided until the final minutes. The 2017 Valero Alamo Bowl was no different as #15 TCU held on in the final minutes to win 39-37 against #13 Stanford.

The Horned Frogs now hold the first and second largest comebacks in Valero Alamo Bowl history, overcoming a 21-3 first-half deficit this year against Stanford and a 31-point deficit at halftime against Oregon two years ago in a thrilling triple overtime win.

Stanford controlled the ball in the first half, including a 15-yard run from running back and Heisman finalist Bryce Love in the first quarter and two touchdown passes from quarterback KJ Costello to wide receiver J.J. Arcega-Whiteside to take a 21-3 lead at the half.


TCU stormed back in the second half behind big plays from quarterback Kenny Hill, who won Valero Alamo Bowl offensive MVP honors, and a 76-yard punt return from receiver Desmon White, which broke a Valero Alamo Bowl record.

In the fourth consecutive Top-15 matchup in Valero Alamo Bowl history, TCU receiver Jalen Reagor racked up 169 receiving yards, third-best in Valero Alamo Bowl history, and recorded another Valero Alamo Bowl record 93-yard touchdown catch in the fourth quarter.

Stanford's Bryce Love ran for 145 yards and had a 69-yard touchdown run in the third quarter, while Costello and Arcega-Whiteside connected for a Valero Alamo Bowl record third touchdown pass in the fourth quarter giving Stanford a 37-36 lead with 6:42 on the clock.

TCU's Cole Bunce's 33-yard field goal with just over three minutes left put the Horned Frogs up 39-37 and an interception by safety Innis Gaines with two minutes left secured a TCU victory.

TCU linebacker Travin Howard earned Valero Alamo Bowl defensive MVP honors for the second time in the last three years after tallying four solo and six assisted tackles on the night.

Oklahoma State's 38-8 victory in the 2016 Valero Alamo Bowl was the third largest margin of victory in Valero Alamo Bowl history. This was also the Cowboys' fourth visit, and second victory, with the Valero Alamo Bowl.



Quarterback Mason Rudolph connected with receiver James Washington nine times for 171 yards and a touchdown.

Rudolph finished his noteworthy Valero Alamo Bowl performance with a 314-yard, three touchdowns-showing against Colorado. Rudolph was the ninth player to pass for 300 yards and the seventh to pass for at least three touchdowns in Bowl history.


Oklahoma State did much of their damage offensively through the air but the ground game was still a factor for the Cowboys as they rushed for 189 yards. Cowboys freshman tailback Justice Hill carried 19 times for 100 yards and a TD, and Chris Carson ran 11 times for 61 yards and scored once.



Kansas State was unable to recover an onside kick with 1:21 remaining in the game and UCLA kneeled the ball to cool what was a Wildcat scoring explosion in the second half.

Kansas State scored 15 unanswered points in the third quarter to overcome a 31-6 halftime deficit and cut the lead to 31-21 before the Bruins got a field goal from Ka'imi Fairbairn to go up 10. Kansas State executed a 15-play, 91-yard drive capped off by a one-yard TD run by Jake Waters to cut the lead to 34-28.

UCLA responded quickly with a 67-yard TD run by Paul Perkins and after a failed two point conversion, led 40-26. Waters led the Wildcats back down the field and threw a 29-yard TD pass to Tyler Lockett, to end the scoring.



Oregon quarterback ran for 133 yards - a Valero Alamo Bowl record for a quarterback. His 253 passing yards and touchdown pass helped lead the Ducks to their third straight bowl victory.

Oregon senior receiver Josh Huff's 104 receiving yards helped him set the Oregon single-season receiving record with 1,140 yards. His touchdown reception helped Oregon extend its lead just before halftime.

The standing room only crowd of 65,918 was the second-highest attendance in Valero Alamo Bowl history and the game's third-straight sellout. With 7.6 million views, the 2013 game was the 7th most-watched non-BCS game in ESPN history.


No. 23 Texas overcame a 10-point deficit to beat No. 13 Oregon State 31-27 in another sold out Valero Alamo Bowl.


#12 Baylor 67, Washington 56

No. 12 Baylor pulled out a thrilling Valero Alamo Bowl victory in the highest-scoring regulation game in bowl history. The Bears defeated Washington 67-56 on Dec. 29, 2011 at the Alamodome in front of a crowd of 65,256.

Baylor quarterback Robert Griffin III, the first reigning Heisman Trophy winner to appear in the Valero Alamo Bowl, threw for one touchdown and rushed for another. But it was Baylor tailback and offensive MVP, Terrance Ganaway, who led the way with 200 yards and five touchdowns.

The game set various bowl records, including total points in regulation and total offense in a bowl game. Washington took a 56-53 lead with 9:40 to go on a Keith Price 8-yard touchdown run. But the Bears answered with Ganaway's fourth TD of the night to take a lead that Baylor wouldn't relinquish.



Before coming to San Antonio, Oklahoma State wide receiver, Justin Blackmon, had to make a stop in Florida to pick up the Biletnikoff Award as the best receiver in the country. The Biletnikoff winner impressed under the Dome's bright lights as he hauled in nine catches for 117 yards and two touchdowns.

The win netted the Cowboys their 11th victory of the season, the most in program history at the time.

The Cowboy defense held Arizona quarterback Nick Foles in check - intercepting him three times and holding the Wildcat offense to 10 points.

Texas Tech 41, Michigan State 31

The 2009 Valero Alamo Bowl was one for the ages as Texas Tech interim coach Ruffin McNeil led the Red Raiders to a 41-31 upset over the Michigan State Spartans.

TTU quarterback Taylor Potts completed 29 passes for 372 yards and two TDs in the win. Running back Baron Batch balanced the Red Raider attack by running for 100 yards in addition to two scores.

Future NFL Pro Bowler, Kirk Cousins, struggled as the Spartan leader threw two interceptions in the contest.

The game went back and forth through three quarters before Michigan State took a 31-27 lead early in the 4th. But Steven Sheffield gave the Red Raiders a lead with just over five minutes left in the game, and Baron Batch finished it off with another touchdown later in the quarter.

The win kicked off a four-bowl game win streak for Texas Tech.



Northwestern quarterback CJ Bacher had his best game of the season as his 304 yards were his season-high and his three touchdowns tied his season's best. But the Missouri defense held strong on the last play of overtime as they batted down Bacher's attempt to solidify its first Valero Alamo Bowl victory.






Ginn earned Offensive MVP honors while Defensive MVP honors went to Buckeye defensive end Simon Fraser.

The Fifth Builders Square Alamo Bowl had all the makings of a fight to the finish. No. 16 Purdue and No. 24 Oklahoma State shared many similarities, but in the end it was the Purdue Boilermakers, who walked away with the night's top prize, a 33-20 bowl victory.

Purdue quarterback Billy Dicken, the game's Offensive MVP after throwing for a then-bowl record 325 yards, got the Purdue offense on track in the third quarter, leading the Boilermakers on three touchdown drives to break the game open.

The Cowboys added a few scores of their own, but weren't able to keep up with Purdue's scoring pace.


#21 Iowa 27, Texas Tech 0

Tech's prolific run offense never got off the ground as Doak Walker Award winner Byron Hanspard was held to 64 yards rushing by the Hawkeyes after averaging more than 200 yards a game during the regular season, while Tech quarterback Zebbie Lethridge was sacked five times by the talented Iowa defense.

For his then-bowl record rushing total of 113 yards, Iowa running back Sedrick Shaw earned the Offensive MVP award. Hawkeye Jared DeVries had two sacks and won Defensive MVP honors.



Texas A&M's Kyle Bryant, an unlikely hero, kicked a bowl-record five field goals that gave the underdog and 19th-ranked Aggies a victory over No.14 Michigan.

A&M's strong defense held Michigan running back and Heisman candidate Tim Biakabutuka to 94 yards on 24 carries.

As both offenses struggled to get into the end zone, the field goal battle ensued as a combined seven field goals were kicked before another TD. Texas A&M took a 22-13 lead late in the fourth quarter after Bryant connected on a 37-yarder. With just five seconds left in the game, Brian Griese and Amani Toomer hooked up for a 44-yard TD pass that brought the game to a thrilling 22-20 score. But the Aggies recovered the onside kick and escape the Dome with a victory.

The second annual Builders Square Alamo Bowl was a defensive battle between the Pac-10's Washington State Cougars and the Southwest Conference's Baylor Bears.

With the nation's second-ranked defense, Washington State stifled the Baylor offense. The Cougars held Baylor, which set a school record with 359 points during the 1994 regular season, to just 151 yards of total offense. The Bears finished the game with the fewest points, fewest first downs and fewest rushing yards of the season. Not to be outdone, Baylor's physical defense also limited Washington State to just seven yards rushing.

Baylor had a chance to tie the game late, but the Cougars intercepted the Bears to seal their fate and hold on to the 10-3 win.



Cal ran up 445 yards of total offense compared to Iowa's 90, the largest difference in bowl history. Dave Barr, the game's Offensive MVP, completed 21 of 28 passes for 266 yards and fired three touchdown passes as the Bears won their third consecutive bowl game.

The win marked California's 20th victory in 23 games over non-conference opponents from 1989-93.
